By now, the converters have begun receiving the new US2007 engines in their shells. This engine is certified to meet the exhaust emission standards required by law for engines manufactured after January 1, 2007. For the last three years we have had EGR (exhaust gas recirculation) as part of the system to reduce NOx (nitrogen oxide) emissions. Now the US2007 engines have to reduce the NOx and reduce the particulate matter that could come from the tailpipe. To do this they now use EGR at some percent whenever the engine is running. They also had to add a DPT (diesel particulate trap) which includes the muffler. Since this unit is expensive and has various sensors on it,



Prevost decided to install it in the upper rear corner of the vehicle and have the exhaust exit at roof level. This has forced the converters to redesign the rear corner on the driver's side that was part of the rear closet in many conversions.

Because we are throwing more exhaust particles into the oil and we are putting more heat into the combustion process to eliminate the pollutants, the engine is made of harder metals and the pressure used on the injectors is much higher. There is now a new specification for the oil to be used in these engines. It is CJ-4. This oil is fully compatible with the earlier engines and is formulated to absorb the exhaust particles better.

The coolant requirements are the same as before: red (fuchsia) colored diesel formulation coolant with additives. Remember that you must use coolants for heavy duty diesel engines which can be purchased at truck dealers, truck stops and commercial parts supply facilities. You cannot get it at a car parts store or Wal-Mart.

The DPT (diesel particulate trap) catches the exhaust particles in the catalytic section. These particles (soot) are trapped and burned off through the regeneration process. This section of the DPT will need to be replaced every 150,000 miles through an exchange program with Detroit Diesel.

Along with this is the change in the diesel fuel requirements. All diesel fuels must be ultra-low sulphur (15 parts per million). This should be the only fuel you find at the pumps and should be labeled as such. This fuel is compatible with all previous diesel engines, regardless of the manufacturer. Use of other than this fuel in the 2007 engines will cause the DPT to become clogged early and it violates the EPA standards for air quality.

As you can see, these changes to keep up with EPA standards are ongoing. The next step is in 2010 and there should not be a problem with Prevost meeting the standard. The technology for these changes has improved greatly from 2004 and we expect fewer problems with the newer engines.

For most of you who pull a car behind the motor home, the coach does not even know that the car is there. So braking and stopping distances remain as we have tested them! But for the people that tow the larger trailers, remember the basic physics of motion and stopping: your total combined vehicle weight is what you must stop. Once put into motion, the mass of the vehicles is such that you will not stop the units in a short distance. Engine brakes and retarders aid in this process, but it is still a combination of braking ability and distance to get the vehicle slowed down. Always leave yourself a good distance from the vehicle in front of you as a safety margin. Be safe!






What has black skin and weighs about a pound at birth, but then grows snow white hair and reaches a weight around 1500 pounds? Polar Bears! In October,

After securing the bear, it is hauled to the polar bear jail, outside of town. There it is quarantined for around a month, having no food or access to humans. Then the bear is transported by helicopter about 35 miles out of town to be released.

It is not safe for tourists to meet bears around town and, fortunately, none of us did. Instead, we opted for a ride on the "tundra buggy". This allowed us to view the bears from a safe environment. And yes, we saw bears. What a treat to become one of the few humans to see these breathtaking animals up close, in the wild. We all agreed this is the stuff that dreams are made of.

location gave us a beautiful view of the snow capped "Three Sister's Mountains" about 35 miles from our campsite.


